### The Murder of McWorthy.

An inquest was held by the Coroner yesterday afternoon in the case of Edward W. McWorthy, who on Tuesday morning last, was shot and killed by James Sullivan on the corner of Dupont and Sutter streets. Flora Sanders, with whom McWorthy had been living, testified that the accused was a "bookkeeper" by occupation, and that he was of a peaceable and quiet disposition. She had heard that Sullivan had threatened to "get even" on both McWorthy and her if they did not let Rosie Kelly alone. Police Officer Warren detailed the circumstances of the arrest of Sullivan and the finding of McWorthy in a dying condition. No pistol, he said, could be found upon either of the men. Dr. Blach, City Physician, testified as to the revelations of the autopsy. Sullivan was present with his attorney, but refused to make any statement. Upon the testimony presented, the jury charged Sullivan with the crime of murder.

### The Murder of Edward McWorthy.

No new facts have been developed in the murder of Edward McWorthy, yesterday morning, by James Sullivan. Sullivan is still reticent in regard to the shooting, but explains that he is acting under the advice of his counsel. When his case was called in the Police Court this morning it was continued until next Tuesday, in order to await developments of the inquest.

An autopsy was held last evening on McWorthy's remains, and it was found that the bullet, after entering the left temple, passed through the brain, shattering the skull also on the right side, about two inches above the ear.
